- The reprint of the historic Constitution of 1878 is completed in this issue. A few separates of the proceedings of the convention and of the Constitution are to be printed and sold for a price sufficient to cover the expense of printing.
- ¶ The study of Northwestern history will be greatly stimulated by the acquisition of the Bagley collection by the University of Washington Library.
- The articles on the Northern Pacific Railroad carry a pathos in that both General Hazard Stevens and Hanford W. Fairweather died between the time of writing and of publishing the articles.
- ¶ Rev. Herbert H. Gowen, Professor of Oriental Language and Literature in the University of Washington, has an article in this issue on The Centenary of Kemehameha the Great. The Chicago firm of Fleming H. Revell & Company is now publishing a book on this subject by Doctor Gowen in which the great Hawaiian is called "The Napoleon of the Pacific."
- William S. Lewis, Corresponding Secretary of the Eastern Washington Historical Society, is preparing some more articles on the pioneers of Old Oregon for publication in this *Quarterly*.
