The first investigations along the lines covered in this book were begun in 1897. More intensive studies were made in subsequent summers, notably that of 1919. The wealth of material in the present volume makes one feel that it has been worth while to wait. It is now a dependable, useful book, abundantly illustrated, a joyful companion for any who visit the wonderland of Mount Rainier National Park. Mr. Taylor is a biologist in the Bureau of Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture. Mr. Shaw was formerly Professor of Zoology in the State College of Washington.

Glimpses of Our National Monuments. (Washington: National Park Service, 1926. Pp. 74.)

As a companion to the former pamphlet Glimpses of Our National Parks, this little pamphlet, Glimpses of Our National Monuments will be welcome to all Americans who love their country's wealth of outdoor beauties. Few are aware of the number of such monuments administered by three Departments, Interior, Agriculture and War. There are here listed a total of 56 National Monuments. The pamphlet is beautifully illustrated.

Notes on the History of the Pacific Station from the Colonial Period and the Early Period of Confederation until the Regular Service Across Canada of the C. P. R. in 1887. By MAJOR F. V. LONGSTAFF. (Reprinted from the Canadian Defence Quarterly for April, 1927. Pp. 292-309.)

This note is written to call attention to some valuable historical work which is being done by Major Longstaff of the Canadian Machine Gun Corps. The paper above listed is the second of a series of historical articles recording the history of the Empire trade routes across British North America and over the Pacific Ocean. The first article appeared in the Canadian Defence Quarterly for April, 1926, Volume 3, Number 3. Subsequent articles are to follow. Major Longstaff is Convenor of the Maritime Committee of the British Columbia Historical Association.

Documentary Source Book of American History, 1606-1926. By WILLIAM MACDONALD. (New York: Macmillan, 1926. Pp. 713.)

Students of history who are familiar with the series of docu-

mentary source books edited by William MacDonald and published by the Macmillan Company will be glad to learn of the new edition of the general source book of American history from 1606 to date. The latest edition contains the Fourteen Points of Woodrow Wilson and eleven later documents ending with the Senate Resolution of Adherence to the World Court, dated January 27, 1926.

Custer's Last Battle. By Charles Francis Roe. (New York: Robert Bruce, 18 Old Slip, 1927. Pp. 40. \$1.00.)

This pamphlet forms a valuable addition to the literature of the Sioux Indian War. It contains a reprint of the address delivered by General Roe in 1904 before the Albany Convention of the National Guard of New York, and now practically unobtainable in the original form. As a supplement to this account, the pamphlet contains E. J. McClernand's March of the Montana Column in which General Roe participated. The value of the publication is greatly enhanced by the numerous maps, photographs and other illustrations included.

Fort Langley, 1827-1927. By DENYS NELSON. (Vancouver, B.C..: Art, Historical and Scientific Association, 1927. Pp. 31. 35 cents.)

This publication issued exactly one hundred years after the beginning of the construction of Fort Langley gives the record of a century of settlement in the valley of the lower Fraser River. The author has zealously brought together from widely separated sources many pertinent historical facts. Numerous footnote references indicate the places from which these facts have been obtained. The illustrations add greatly to the interest and value of the work.

History of the State of Idaho. By C. J. Brosnan. (New York: Scribner's, 1926. Pp. 260.)

In the preface to this new edition of the *History of the State of Idaho*, the author acknowledges special indebtedness to Mr. T. C. Elliott of Walla Walla, Washington, and Mr. John E. Rees of Salmon, Idaho. The work remains substantially the same as the original edition of 1918 with the addition of some twenty-five pages of new matter. Recent events including Idaho's participation in the World War are recorded and the supplements and tables are brought down to date.
