Marina Gržinić is at the Institute of Philosophy at the Scientific and Research Center of the Slovenian Academy of Science and Arts, and since 2003 on the faculty of the Academy of Fine Arts in Vienna. She also works as a freelance media theorist, art critic and curator. In collaboration with Aina Smid she has produced more than forty video art projects (see www.grzinic-smid.si). Her most recent book in English is Situated Contemporary Art Practices, Art, Theory and Activism from (the East of) Europe (2004); in French, Fiction reconstructed/Une fiction reconstruit (2005).

Mirjam M. Hladnik is an assistant professor at the University of Ljubljana and research fellow at the Institute for Slovenian Emigration Studies, Scientific Research Center of the Slovenian of Sciences and Arts. His most recent books are *Uvod v kulturno zgodovino Velike voj*ne (Don't send a word of sorrow. Cultural history of World War I, w000), *Majstori i muze* (Masters and muses, 2002), and *Zgodovina historičnega mišljenja* (History of historical thought, with Marjeta Šašel Kos, Nada Grošelj and Gregor Pobežin, 2006).

Dimitrij Rupel is foreign minister of the Republic of Slovenia, former ambassador to the U.S., and mayor of Ljubljana. He holds a Ph.D. in sociology from Brandeis University. In 1982 he joined the faculty of the University of Ljubljana. In addition to authoring novels and plays, he has published numerous scholarly articles, essays, and books, the most recent

of which are Svoboda proti državi (1998) and Srečanja in razhajanja (2001).

Since 2002 he has been a research fellow and coordinator for International Cooperation at the Scientific Research Center of the Slovenian Academy of Sciences and Arts.
