- Judge F. W. Howay, well known among historians in the Pacific Northwest, has made a careful study of one of the problems troublesome to writers for more than a century. His article on the loss of the "Tonquin" will undoubtedly be accepted as the best solution yet offered.
- ¶ The purchase of Alaska has been debated by historians more than any other item of Pacific Coast history. Victor J. Farrar's study of the background of that event will therefore find many interested readers. Much of the so-called diplomatic "mystery" is dissipated by this study.
