- ¶ A recent visit from Oswald Garrison Villard of New York inspired a careful search among old records to show how his father, Henry Villard, had saved the Universities of Oregon and Washington, beginning in 1876.
- ¶ Missionary H. H. Spalding has not been known as a botanist. The facts have been assembled by Professor J. Orin Oliphant, now of Bucknell University, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania.
- ¶ Charles W. Smith, Librarian of the University of Washington, may be surprised to find here his "New Deal in Documents," reprinted from *Northwest Science* of March, 1934.
