**Charles Bukowski** is professor of international studies and director of the Institute of International Studies at Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois. He was a Senior Fulbright Lecturer in the Department of International Relations at the University of Ljubljana in 1994. His current research focuses on Slovenia's foreign policy and the problems of small states in the international system.

**Aleš Gabrič** is a research fellow at the Institute for Contemporary History in Ljubljana and professor of Slovene cultural history at the University of Ljubljana. He is the author of several books and articles on twentieth-century Slovene political and cultural history co-author of textbooks for Slovene schools. His chief interests include cultural policy, education, and relations between the communist authorities and intellectuals.

**Mateja Režek** was until 2006 at the Institute for Contemporary History in Ljubljana. She is now a fellow at the Institute of Nova revija. She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Ljubljana (2000) and is author of *Med resničnostjo in iluzijo: slovenska in jugoslovanska politika v desetletju po sporu z Informbirojem 1948-1958* (2005) She has published articles on Slovene and Yugoslav political history after 1945.

**Tadeja Tominšek Rihtar** is a researcher at the Institute for Contemporary History in Ljubljana currently taking part in compilation of a detailed list of WW II and post-war victims. Some of the results have been published in *Slovenska novejša zgodovina 1848 – 1992* (2005); she has also published results in the journal *Prispevki* and in historical collections.

**Alojzija Zupan Sosič** is a faculty member in the Department of Slovene Studies at Faculty of Arts in Ljubljana. She has published widely on comparative literature (Slovene and Euro-American modernism and postmodernism), Slovene love poetry, narrative theory and genres, and gender theory and identity. Her book on the *Contemporary Slovene Novel at the End of the Century* appeared in 2003.

**Peter Vodopivec** is a professor of history and research consultant at the Institute for Contemporary History. His research interests are the history of eighteenth- and nineteenth-century middle classes and nineteenth- and twentieth-century socio-economic and political history. His most recent book is *Od Pohlinove slovnice do samostojne države, Šlovesna zgodovina od konca 18. do konca 20. stoletja* (2006).
